BIRD RINGING IN 1979

There was no qualified ringer resident on Lundy in 1979 but Roy Bircher, Martin Davies, Michael King, Mick Rogers and Tony Taylor visited the island at various times, providing cover for a fortnight in spring, six weeks in autumn and a week at Christmas. Richard Campey helped at all these times and continued his ringing training.

536 birds of 35 species were ringed during the year. Two species—Bar-tailed Godwit and Rüppell's Warbler—were added to the island's ringing list. Other species which had rarely been caught included Dotterel, Woodcock, Melodious and Icterine Warblers, two Yellow-browed Warblers and a Woodchat Shrike. Michael King raised the Firecrest total impressively by eleven and his seventeen Siskins more than doubled the number ringed on the island since 1947.

Nearly half of the birds ringed were caught in the two Heligoland traps. The remainder were caught in mist-nets, almost all in Millcombe. The Terrace trap is still in a good state of repair but it was felt that its effectiveness had been reduced by excessive growth of the bushes at its entrance. These were therefore pruned extensively in late autumn. The Quarter Wall trap had suffered considerable damage in winter gales and most of its wire netting had to be replaced at Easter. The list below gives grand totals for all species ringed since 1947. These figures were last shown in the report for 1973. Since then, the list of most frequently ringed species has changed considerably. Only a handful of cliff-nesting seabirds has been ringed in recent years, largely because of the absence of a fulltime warden. However, there has been more ringing activity at night and 105 Manx Shearwaters and 14 Storm Petrels have been caught. In the latter case, only one had ever been ringed on Lundy prior to 1975 when tape-recordings of the birds' song were first used to attract them into the mist-nets. It has been found elsewhere that by using this technique birds can be caught in areas where they do not breed. So we are no closer to establishing whether there is a colony on Lundy.

If seabirds are excluded from the totals, it is found that 17% of all other birds have been ringed since 1973. Ringers do not usually select what species they catch in Heligoland traps or mist-nets—they just ring whatever happens to get caught. So it is reasonable to assume that if significantly more or less than 17% of a species' grand total has been caught since 1973, then that species' population has increased or decreased significantly. Many common species, including Blackbird, Willow Warbler, Chiffchaff, Spotted Flycatcher, Dunnock, Pied Wagtail, Starling, Linnet and Chaffinch show little or no change. Major increases have occurred in Wren, Goldcrest and Firecrest, probably because the succession of mild winters in the 1970's allowed their populations to build up. Robins have been ringed more frequently, perhaps for the same reason. Greenfinches have increased markedly, but the reason for this is less clear. Among the summer visitors, Redstarts, Blackcaps and Garden Warblers have become commoner.

Species showing big decreases include Song Thrush, Wheatear, Whinchat, Grasshopper Warbler and Whitethroat. Cuckoo, Skylark, Sedge Warbler and Pied Flycatcher also appear to have declined. The drastic reduction in numbers of Whitethroats from 1969 onwards is well documented. It coincided with long periods of drought in their African wintering areas. More recently there has also been much evidence of a major decline in Wheatear populations throughout Britain.

1052114 Shag. Ringed as pullus 28.6.72. Ring only found on beach at West Lizard, Cornwall 18.7.79 (135 km SSW).

SS65910 Woodpigeon. Ringed as full grown 21.5.78. Shot Woolsery, Devon 11.1.79 (31 km SSE).
